




2021 EXPENSE BREAKDOWN

Making farming accessbile to more people:

The average age of farmers in Tennessee continues to steadily rise. One of the goals of Field School, our beginner farmer business training program, is to make farming an accessible career path for people of all ages so that new generations of farmers continue to enter the industry.

National Farmer Statistics

USDA Agriculture Census Data (2017)

- The average age of farmers is **57.5**.
- 96% of farms are family-owned.
- 11% of farmers are active military or veterans.
- 36% of farmers are women.

- The average age of Field School participants is 44.

All of the programs and services listed below are entirely dependent upon giving. Donations made to ARCD cover these costs.

\$25

Helps pay for regional farmers market promotion. During the pandemic ARCD helped 32 markets pivot to ensure safety protocols were followed while still allowing for farm-to-consumer sales.

\$50

Covers the cost of outfitting one AmeriCorps Service Member with their uniform. AppalCorps Service Members serve across the state working to improve food sovereignty in their communities.

\$100

Covers the cost for one Power of Produce Club for Kids. PoP Club is a fun way for youth to engage in their local food system while learning about nutrition and sampling fruits and veggies.

\$200
